Who We Are

Green Ridge Cemetery is a 181-year-old cemetery in Kenosha, Wisconsin. It was the city's first cemetery (and its only cemetery for many years), and as such has a long history of being a multi-ethnic, non-denominational, and non-sectarian cemetery. Those interred here include city founders, statesmen, public figures, inventors, founders of local industry, educational leaders, and military veterans of wars since the American Revolution.



Problem Statement and Definition

We are a 181-year-old cemetery that does business like a 181-year-old cemetery.

That is to say that we have a lot of paper. Paper maps, paper documents, paper records

—and what isn't on paper currently resides in the head of Peter Shaw Johnson, our General Manager.

After a health scare this year, Peter realized we were in danger of losing these histories.

He began to brainstorm ways we could preserve the information so it would be easily accessible for future generations.



Solution

Cemeteries all over the world are turning to apps to give the general public access to their records. These all share a few common features: a map of the property, numbered monuments of interest, and photos with text and/or audio descriptions. We think that this would be a good solution for our cemetery as well. Our board envisions several phases of this project, and they hope, over time, to have an app with the aforementioned features, as well as a searchable index and living memorials.



Audience

Green Ridge Cemetery is utilized by students as young as third grade and by people all over the world. However, most of our inquiries are from Americans who are fifty-years-old and up. They are not all technologically savvy, and often their devices are several years old. We would like to pay particular attention to preventing issues that seem to plague some of the other cemetery app reviews. Common complaints are: too buggy/constant crashing; no offline feature for mapping, photos, etc; not useful for those using the app at home; map images aren't high resolution; text too small; audio too soft.



Other relevant Apps (if known and obvious)

- Find A Grave –what a lot of people are used to using
- ANC Explorer (Arlington National Cemetery) and Ohlsdorf Cemetery—Examples of too complicated
- Historic Oakland Cemetery (Atlanta)—feels like something our researchers could handle
- Atlanta's Oakland Cemetery (same cemetery as above, but by Rothrock Group) maybe a stretch?



Content for the App

- Map of cemetery showing location of places of interest/monuments/graves
- List of 25-50 most noteworthy places of interest/monuments/graves
- Photo to accompany each item
- Text and audio description to accompany each item

Some research shows that the male/female numbers more equal, but men more likely to use internet and apps.





Special Considerations


- Older tech (crashes and glitches)
